1. APOLOGIES

Apologies were received from Councillor Duncan.

2. MINUTES

The minutes of the meeting held on 5 November 2013 were agreed and signed by the Chair, with the amendment of the word "offers" to "officers" in the first bullet point of minute 13.

3. DEPUTATIONS / PUBLIC ADDRESSES

None.

4. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

None.

5. MATTERS OF URGENCY WHICH BY REASON OF SPECIAL CIRCUMSTANCES THE CHAIR IS OF THE OPINION SHOULD BE CONSIDERED

The Chair stated that he and Councillor Hibbert had recently attended a Member training day at the Institute of licensing annual conference in Birmingham and that this Council was following best practice in connection with licensing hearings. The Chair stated that the only exception to this was that the Committee's determinations did not always contain sufficient evidence as to how the decision was reached and relied on the minutes of the meeting for that information. He considered it was important that the determination should contain all the information on how the decision had been reached as magistrates, in an appeal situation, did not always look at the minutes in relation to a determination.

The Chair stated that he had congratulated the officers on being consistent with best practice.

6. FIXED ODDS BETTING TERMINALS

The Senior Licensing Officer presented a report on issues relating to Fixed Odds Betting Terminals (FOBTs). He stated that a number of local authorities were lobbying the Government regarding concerns about FOBTs and suggested that if they were successful the Council should follow a similar route.

Members' expressed concerns about the prevalence of FOBTs and the dangers for vulnerable people. A question was asked if a byelaw relating to the machines could be imposed in the Borough. The Senior Licensing Officer stated that any byelaw would need to be signed off by the Home Office and they had not done so in the past when the Council had wanted to introduce Hackney Carriage byelaws. He suggested that it would be preferable to monitor the progress made by other local authorities, particularly Liverpool and Lambeth, in lobbying the Government.

Members expressed the view that they would wish to see the Council being more proactive,

especially as there was a duty of care to residents, and to lobby the Government. The Senior Licensing officer stated that both Lambeth and Liverpool have had complaints made to them in respect of FOBTs, and Liverpool had a serious problem with the machines. No complaints had been made to this Council and action would have been recommended to the Committee if any had been received.

It was noted that fourteen local authorities in London wanted to use the Sustainable Communities Act 2007 to control the spread and activities of betting shops, where many FOBTs were placed. Members asked the officers to look further into this and other legislation and to report back to the Committee in April 2014.

RESOLVED:

That the officers look into the effect of FOBTs in the Borough and report back to the Committee in April 2014 on this issue, including legislation available to control the use of Fixed Odds Betting Terminals.

7. STREET TRADING CONSENT

The Senior Licensing Officer presented a report seeking to relocate a Street trading Consent Site from its current position to the preferred option site in an attempt to confirm a safer location for the trader to operate. Photographs of the current site and proposed new site were circulated at the meeting.

The Senior Licensing Officer stated that the site could be adopted if the Council wished to do so.

Any objections to the proposal to designate the street trading consent site would be reported to the next meeting of the Committee for consideration.

RESOLVED:

That notice be published in a local newspaper of the intention that with effect from 1 February 2014 the existing Street Trading Consent Site in Gowerton Road, Brackmills, Northampton be withdrawn in favour of a new site nominated by the Senior Licensing Officer in agreement with Mr Chris Barker, Brackmills Industrial Estate Security Manager and the street trader, Mr Podolczak.

8. EXCLUSION OF PUBLIC AND PRESS

The Chair moved that the Public and Press be excluded from the remainder of the meeting on the grounds that there was likely to be disclosure to them of such categories of exempt information as defined by Section 100(1) of the Local Government Act 1972 as listed against such items of business by reference to the appropriate paragraph of Schedule 12A to such Act.

The Motion was Carried.

9. REVIEW OF HACKNEY DRIVER'S LICENCE

The Senior Licensing Officer stated that the title of the report in the agenda was incorrect and that the Committee were being asked to review a Private Hire Driver's Licence, and not a Hackney Driver's Licence.

The Committee heard evidence and a witness was called.

1. Purpose

1.1 This report updates the Committee on the consultation regarding the proposed relocation of the existing street trading consent site on Gowerton Road, Brackmills, Northampton.

2. Recommendations

- 1.1.That the recommended consent site be adopted from 1st March 2014, and the current location be withdrawn.
- (i) the existing street trading consent site in Gowerton Road, Brackmills, Northampton is withdrawn in favour of the new site nominated by the Senior Licensing Officer in agreement with Mr Chris Barker, Brackmills Industrial Estate Security Manager and the street trader Mr Podolczak.

The original recommendation suggested a commencement date of 1st February 2014 this will be delayed by a month to comply with the statutory regulations.

3. Issues and Choices

3.1 Report Background

3.1.1 At its meeting of 10 December 2013, the Licensing Committee agreed to consult on the withdrawal of the existing Street Trading Consent Site in Gowerton Road Brackmills in favour of a new suggested location shown on the map as at Appendix A.

- 3.1.2 The statutory advertisement was placed in the local press and on the council website setting out the proposed new location.
- 3.1.3 Consultations have taken place between the Police, Highways and the Brackmills site manager Mr Barker who has notified businesses in the area.
- 3.1.4 There have been no objections and those consulted have recognised the advantages of the suggested new location.
- 3.1.5 Street trading consents are regulated under Schedule 4 of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1982 (LGMPA) and authorise the selling, or offering for sale, of any article in a street. The term 'street' includes any road, footway or other area to which the public has access without payment.

This includes all hot and cold food vendors, for example:

All vendors of burgers, kebabs, doughnuts, ice cream, etc.

It also includes:

All vendors of non-food products who trade on static pitches from any vehicle, stall, barrow, trailer, or any other moveable construction.

- 3.1.6 The granting of street trading consent is a matter within the general discretion of the local authority.
- 3.1.7 All streets within Northampton Borough are prohibited streets, with specified pitches granted a street trading consent. There are currently 24 street trading pitches within the Borough.

3.2 Issues

There are no known issues with regard to this change of location.

3.3 Choices (Options)

- 3.3.1 To implement the recommendation.
- 3.3.2 To reject the recommendation.

4. Implications (including financial implications)

4.1 Policy

4.1.1 There would be no change to the existing street trading policy regarding the prohibited streets and consent locations.

4.2 Resources and Risk

4.2.1 Resources would not be affected and there are no known risks.

4.3 Legal

- 4.3.1 The designation of streets / roads as consented streets is lawful within the meaning of the LGMPA Schedule 4 Section 2 (1) (c).
- 4.3.1 The proposed resolution is unopposed and hence the committee has discretion to adopt the said consent street as advertised.
- 4.3.2 The Council shall publish notice that they have passed such a resolution in two consecutive weeks in a local newspaper circulating in their area
- 4.3.3 The first publication shall not be later than 28 days before the day specified in the resolution for the coming into force of the designation

4.4 Equality

4.4.1 There are no equality issues to be addressed; any issues relating to public safety have been addressed during the consultation period.

4.5 Consultees (Internal and External)



 - Applicant (or his/her representative) will address the sub-committee first and put their case.
 - 2. The Chair leads an examination of the Applicant's case. First, the panel may ask questions and then the Chair invites Responsible and Interested Parties to participate. Questions may only relate to the points made by the applicant.
 - 3. The Representors (and responsible and Interested Parties) then state their case.
 - 4. The Chair leads an examination of the Representor's case.

Each party will be given an equal maximum period of time in which to present their case and may, if given permission by the Chair, question any other party.

 - o By the Applicant
- Sub-committee retires and may call for the Solicitor for advice if required.
- Sub-Committee deliver their decision and reasons for their decision at the conclusion of the meeting IF:
 - 1. Application for conversion of existing licence

 - 3. Application by holder of justices' licence for grant of personal licence
 - 4. Application for conversion and variation of premises licence (including variation of DPS)
 - 5. Application for conversion and variation of club premises certificate

 - 7. Review of Premises Licence following Closure Order

In all other cases, the Sub-committee delivers its decision and reasons for its decision within five working days beginning with the day on which the hearing was held.
