Dear Mr Edwards

In relation to Fiddlers at 130 Wellingborough Road, Northampton, I will like to object against the extension on the licence certificate as I have lived approximately 20 years in the vicinity of this pub with my family. I have seen a decline in the clientèle that abuses the local residential areas by urinating and sometime worse but have noticed in the past year of the constant loud music and arguments which follow the closing of the pub at the end of the night. As this already stretches into the early hours the new licence which might be sanctioned would leave this even later. As my child and I frequently use this road to go to the shops and park especially on a Sunday the broken glasses and the remains of the night before is offensive. Also taking into account as I work shifts and as the parking is very congestive I have to park closer to the pub and on occasions as I have made my way to work and also making my way home I have encountered abusive language and on one occasions this did intrude on my personal safety.

I hope this would help you with making the correct decisions for the residences in the area. As there has been police attendance more so in the past few years within this area I believe this would increase police presence unnecessarily.

Making a representation about a licence application under the Licensing Act 2003

From 25th April 2012 any person may make a representation (objection) in respect of an application for, or variation to, a premises licence, a club premises certificate, a provisional statement or a review of a premises licence or club premises certificate made in accordance with the Licensing Act 2003. Representations can be in favour of, or against an application. BUT any representation must relate to how the authorisations on the licence (the licensable activities) impact on the promotion of one or more of the four licensing objectives which are:

Dear Mr Edwards

To my horror at mid afternoon of today's date, I was informed that Fiddlers Ph had applied for an extension to the opening drinking hours, during this time I was informed that to reject this proposal I had until 1800 HRS to put the objection in writing.

Having lived at Palmerston Court, Palmerston Road for nearly 5 years with my fiancée Tracy, we continually experience instances of Anti Social Behaviour, this varies from drunks leaving the rear of the Fiddlers pub, using our arch way as a place to urinate, using our own private car park to park their vehicles, an increase in crime, increase in littering, these incidents fall under:

The Prevention of Crime and Disorder
The Prevention of Public Nuisance
The Protection of Children from Harm
Public Safety

Currently Fiddlers Pub often has music playing loudly until the early hours of the morning, sometimes 2-3 am, in the summer when the hot summer days are here, having the windows open during the night is often not possible if we want a decent night's sleep, it was only the other month when we were woken to a drunk male with his hand on our bedroom window being sick under it, often when the pub closes the customers filter out onto Palmerston Road to the awaiting taxis, creating noise, and dropping glass bottles onto the surrounding paths and roads.

If the pub has its opening hours increased I can only see the problems escalating further, and the problems deepening, we have numerous Police Incident Numbers relating to Anti Social Behaviour.

As a further note of concern we have not seen any information locally to the proposal of the later license, under the application process I would have thought that local residents would have to be made aware of the proposal, and given the right to object, by fortune I only spoke with a local resident who informed me.

As it stands I am pretty sure Fiddlers does not adhere to the current license so any extension given I would imagine would be extended over and above what it should be by law anyway!
